Samuel Chatwood By Syd Waterman ... 2019

This large and handsome lock was made, prior to 1900, as a one-off "special" for a large bank installation in Brussels. It incorporates a single keyhole giving access to two locks, one above the other. The upper lock controls a shutter over the keyhole of the lower main lock. To operate the lock the renter must first dial up the correct combination using the 4 brass dials. The custodian then uses the bank's key to remove the shutter from the lower lock. The renter can now use his key to withdraw the bolt.

The main lock has the "Invincible" anti-pressure bolt stump and the combination of the 4 dials can be altered by using a spanner-like change key on the back of the lock.

No patent was found detailing this exact lock.

In addition to the safe and bank locks Chatwood manufactured padlocks and rim locks, although both of the latter are hard to find.
